Iowa Leading Indicators Index March 2012 Report

Tax Research and Program Analysis Section Released May 2, 2012

The Iowa Leading Indicators Index (ILII) rose to 104.9 (100=1999) in March 2012 from 104.7 in February. The Iowa non-farm employment coincident index recorded a 0.09 percent rise in March, which extends the streak of employment gains to eighteen consecutive months.

The ILII's value increased 0.2 percent in March, after a 0.1 percent increase in February and a 0.1 percent increase in January. During the six-month span through March, the ILII increased 0.5 percent (an annualized rate of 0.9 percent) and remained in positive territory for a second month. The six-month diffusion index was 62.5 with five of the eight components (average weekly manufacturing hours, residential building permits, initial unemployment insurance claims, the national yield spread, and the lowa stock market index) experiencing an increase of more than 0.05 percent over the last half a year.

In March, six of eight lowa Leading Indicators Index components contributed positively. The positive contributors were the national yield spread, initial unemployment insurance claims (inverted), the lowa stock market index, residential building permits, average weekly manufacturing hours, and diesel fuel consumption. The new orders index and the agricultural futures profits index both contributed negatively.

a. Percentage changes in the ILII do not always equal changes in the level of the ILII due to rounding.

b. A diffusion index measures the proportion of components that are rising based on the actual changes (not the standardized contributions to the ILII). Components experiencing increases greater than 0.05 percent are assigned a value of 1.0, components that experience changes less than an absolute value of 0.05 percent are assigned a value of 0.5, and components experiencing decreases greater than 0.05 percent are assigned a value of 0.0.

a. For all component series except for the yield spread and the lowa stock market index, the values represent 12-month backward moving averages.

b. The agricultural futures profits index is computed as the sum of the standardized symmetric percent changes in the four series, each weighted by the commodity's annual share of lowa cash farm income (updated August 30, 2011).

c. Arrows indicate the direction of the series' contribution to the ILII for the latest month.

d. Changes in unemployment claims are inverted when added to the ILII, thus a negative change in the series contributes positively to the index.

ILII Components

- **Yield spread:** Difference between the yield on 10-year Treasury bonds and 3-month Treasury notes. During March, the yield spread rose to 2.09 percent as the long-term rate rose 20 basis points and the short-term rate fell 1 basis point. For the month, the yield spread contributed 0.07 to the ILII.
- Average weekly unemployment claims: Weekly average of initial claims for unemployment insurance in lowa. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average and are inverted when added to the ILII. This component contributed 0.06 to the ILII value. The 12-month moving average of claims fell to 3,573 with unemployment claims for the month 22.6 percent below March 2011 claims. Initial claims for March 2012 were 13.5 percent above average March claims (1987-2008).
- **lowa stock market index:** Capitalization-weighted index of 33 lowa-based or lowa-concentrated publicly-traded companies. During March 2012, 15 of the 33 companies gained value, including 7 of the 12 financial-sector companies. The stock market index increased to 74.20, contributing 0.05 to the ILII value.
- **Building permits:** Number of total permits issued in Iowa for the construction of residential housing units. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. For March, this component contributed 0.04 to the ILII with the 12-month moving average increasing to 657. March 2012 permits were 8.6 percent higher than the number of permits issued in March 2011, but still 33.5 percent below the historical average for March (1998-2008).
- Average weekly manufacturing hours: Weekly average of hours worked in the manufacturing sector in lowa. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. For March 2012, this component contributed 0.02 to the ILII value despite the 12month moving average holding steady at 40.5, due to rounding. March 2012 hours were 40.7 compared to 40.0 hours in March 2011.
- **Diesel fuel consumption:** Number of taxable gallons of diesel fuel sold in Iowa. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. Diesel fuel consumption increased 0.4 percent between March 2011 and 2012, causing the 12-month moving average to rise slightly to 54.90 million gallons, and contributing 0.01 to the ILII value.
- New orders index: Diffusion index measuring the share of purchasing managers in lowa reporting increases in orders received for manufacturing output. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. In March, the monthly value of the index fell to 75.5 from 76.0 in February, and it was also below the value of 80.2 from a year ago. The 12month moving average of the new orders index fell to 64.6, contributing -0.02 to the ILII.
- Agricultural futures profits index: Composite measure of corn, soybean, hog, and cattle expected profits, measured as the futures price less estimated breakeven costs, weighted by the respective share of lowa annual cash receipts. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. During March, this component contributed -0.07 to the ILII value as the 12-month moving average of expected profits for all commodities declined. Compared to last year, corn prices are down 6.8 percent, soybean prices are down 0.8 percent, and expected profitability decreased for both in March. Although cattle prices are up 9.1 percent over last year, that increase was not enough to offset higher production costs. Hog prices fell 3.2 percent over last year and expected profitability also fell. Iowa State has not yet officially released 2012 livestock breakeven costs, but did provide preliminary numbers for the purpose of this report.

Source: Tax Research and Program Analysis Section, Iowa Department of Revenue, produced August 30, 2011 The standardization factors are the inverse of the standard deviation of the month-to-month changes in each component over the January 1999 to June 2011 period. These factors equalize the volatility of the contribution from each component and are normalized to one. The month-to-month changes are based on 12-month backward moving averages for all components except the yield spread and the lowa stock market index. The yield spread and new orders index changes are simple arithmetic changes; month-to-month changes for the rest of the components are computed as symmetric percentage changes. The factors are updated annually during August.

Comments

The lowa Leading Indicators Index (ILII) is designed to forecast the future direction of economic activity in the state of lowa. The techniques used to build the ILII follow those used by The Conference Board to construct the national Leading Economics Index (LEI) prior to the 2001 revisions. A one-month movement in such an index does not produce a clear signal, rather it is necessary to consider the direction of the index over several consecutive months. A contraction signal in the ILII is considered reliable when two conditions are met: 1. The index declines by at least two percent over a six month period (using an annualized rate); and, 2. A majority of the individual components decline over those six months (the six-month diffusion index less than 50.0).

The lowa non-farm employment coincident index measures the change in non-seasonally adjusted, total non-farm employment in the state of lowa. Changes are based on a 12-month moving average of employment and are computed as symmetric percentage changes. The index is a representation of overall economic activity in lowa.

The employment index and the ILII are constructed to have a value of 100 in the year 1999.

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
