


# Iowa Leading Indicators Index March 2015 Report

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The Iowa Leading Indicators Index (ILII) fell to 109.0 (100=1999) in March 2015 from 109.1 in February. The lowa non-farm employment coincident index recorded a 0.15 percent rise in March, which extends the streak of employment gains to 54 consecutive months.

During the six-month span through March, the ILII decreased 0.8 percent (an annualized rate of -1.5 percent). The six-month diffusion index decreased to 37.5 with five of the eight components (average weekly manufacturing hours, agriculture future profits index, new orders index, residential building permits, and yield spread) experiencing an increase of less than 0.05 percent over the last half a year.

In March, four of eight Iowa Leading Indicators Index components contributed positively. The positive contributors were diesel fuel consumption, average weekly unemployment claims (inverted), the national yield spread, and residential building permits. The agricultural futures profits index, the new orders index, average weekly manufacturing hours, and the lowa stock market index were the four components that contributed to the index negatively.

a. Percentage changes in the ILII do not always equal changes in the level of the ILII due to rounding.

b. A diffusion index measures the proportion of components that are rising based on the actual changes (not the standardized contributions to the ILII). Components experiencing increases greater than 0.05 percent are assigned a value of 1.0, components that experience changes less than an absolute value of 0.05 percent are assigned a value of 0.5, and components experiencing decreases greater than 0.05 percent are assigned a value of 0.0.

a. For all component series except for the yield spread and the lowa stock market index, the values represent 12-month backward moving averages.

b. The agricultural futures profits index is computed as the sum of the standardized symmetric percent changes in the four series, each weighted by the commodity's annual share of lowa cash farm income (updated March 9, 2015).

c. Arrows indicate the direction of the series' contribution to the ILII for the latest month.

d. Changes in average weekly initial unemployment insurance claims are inverted when added to the ILII, thus a negative change in the series contributes positively to the index.

# **ILII Components**

- **Diesel fuel consumption:** Number of taxable gallons of diesel fuel sold in Iowa. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. Diesel fuel consumption increased 5.4 percent between March 2014 and 2015, causing the 12-month moving average to rise to 59.70 million gallons from 59.47 in February, and contributing 0.07 to the ILII value.
- Average weekly unemployment claims: Weekly average of initial claims for unemployment insurance in Iowa. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average and are inverted when added to the ILII. This component contributed 0.07 to the ILII value. The 12-month moving average of claims decreased to 3,029 with unemployment claims for the month 25.6 percent below March 2014 claims, and 25.5 percent below average historical claims for March (1987-2013).
- Yield spread: Difference between the yield on 10-year Treasury bonds and 3-month Treasury bills. During March, the yield spread expanded to 2.01 percent as the long-term rate rose 6 basis points while the short-term rate rose 1 basis point. For the month, the yield spread contributed 0.02 to the ILII.
- **Residential building permits:** Number of total permits issued in Iowa for the construction of residential housing units. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. For March, this component contributed 0.01 to the ILII with the 12-month moving average increasing from February to 906. March 2015 permits were 5.3 percent above March 2014, yet 20.4 percent below the historical average for March (1998-2013).
- **Iowa stock market index:** Capitalization-weighted index of 33 Iowa-based or Iowaconcentrated publicly-traded companies. During March 2015, 17 of the 33 companies gained value, including 9 of the 11 financial-sector companies. Despite over half of stocks recording gains, the index dropped to 108.89, contributing -0.01 to the ILII value.
- Average weekly manufacturing hours: Weekly average of hours worked in the manufacturing sector in Iowa. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. For March 2015, this component contributed -0.02 to the ILII value with its decrease to 41.98 from 42.02. March 2015 hours were 41.4, below the 41.8 hours in March 2014, yet 0.5 hours above the historical monthly average of 40.9 (1996-2013).
- New orders index: Diffusion index measuring the share of purchasing managers in lowa reporting increases in orders received for manufacturing output. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. The monthly value of the index increased to 60.5 in March from 49.2 in February; however, the March value is down significantly from 69.4 one year ago. The 12-month moving average of the new orders index dropped to 58.9, contributing -0.05 to the ILII.
- Agricultural futures profits index: Composite measure of corn, soybean, hog, and cattle expected profits, measured as the futures price less estimated breakeven costs, weighted by the respective share of lowa annual cash receipts. Changes are calculated based on a 12-month moving average. During March this component contributed -0.24 to the index with expected profit decreases for all four commodities. Compared to last year, corn prices are down 19.5 percent and soybean prices fell 29.4 percent. Prices for hogs decreased 47.5 percent which is the third consecutive month of negative year over year change. Although cattle prices increased 8.5 percent in March over last year, the breakeven for cattle increased a greater amount, constraining expected profits.

Source: Tax Research and Program Analysis Section, Iowa Department of Revenue, produced September 3, 2014 The standardization factors are the inverse of the standard deviation of the month-to-month changes in each component over the January 1999 to June 2014 period. These factors equalize the volatility of the contribution from each component and are normalized to one. The month-to-month changes are based on 12-month backward moving averages for all components except the yield spread and the Iowa stock market index. The yield spread and new orders index changes are simple arithmetic changes; month-to-month changes for the rest of the components are computed as symmetric percentage changes. The factors are updated annually during August.

### Comments

The Iowa Leading Indicators Index (ILII) is designed to forecast the future direction of economic activity in the state of Iowa. The techniques used to build the ILII follow those used by The Conference Board to construct the national Leading Economics Index (LEI) prior to the 2001 revisions. A one-month movement in such an index does not produce a clear signal, rather it is necessary to consider the direction of the index over several consecutive months. A contraction signal in the ILII is considered reliable when two conditions are met: 1. The index declines by at least two percent over a six month period (using an annualized rate); and, 2. A majority of the individual components decline over those six months (the six-month diffusion index less than 50.0).

The lowa non-farm employment coincident index measures the change in non-seasonally adjusted, total non-farm employment in the state of lowa. Changes are based on a 12-month moving average of employment and are computed as symmetric percentage changes. The index is a representation of overall economic activity in lowa.

The employment index and the ILII are constructed to have a value of 100 in the year 1999.

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
